

on our personal, economic and political lives and how to claim hope in a fearful world.



Then we will turn to how

this identity shift transforms a Christian's responsibility in the public realm.


Food & Faith: Justice, Joy, and Daily Bread



The New Jim Crow

Explore how our current criminal justice system subjects an entire group of people to permanent second-class citizenship similar to the Jim Crow era of the past.



Those incarcerated – predominantly people of color – have difficulty becoming productive citizens upon release from prison because they are denied jobs, housing, financial aid for school, and the right to vote due to their criminal record.

Jonathan Shenk is a member of the New Brunswick Presbytery's

Mass Incarceration Task Force which seeks to educate and engage member congregations to bring healing to a destructive system. He is also a member of the Princeton/ Trenton chapter of the Campaign to End the New Jim Crow and has served as a volunteer prison chaplain.


Hope for the Future


Do What You Have the Power to Do Thursdays, 9:30 – 11:00AM,
