Below is a note from Tom Charles and the Refugee Resettlement Group.

Just four days after the Alhaws' anniversary of their arrival in Princeton, the family has moved to Dallas, Texas, in order to be closer to family, including Osama's sister. We were blessed to have them in our midst for the past year and we have learned much from them. The support for the family from the church, the seminary, the mosque, and the wider community has represented the most intensive and sustained refugee resettlement effort mounted in our sixty years of refugee sponsorships. For many of us, welcoming the stranger has never been so clearly and personally realized. The goodbyes have been bittersweet but, in the end, also hopeful. Thanks again to everyone for everything, and thanks be to God.
