

Goal: To show God's love in our everyday actions.

RECOGNIZING GOD'S GRACE ...

... In Deuteronomy 6:1-9; Leviticus 19:1-2, 9-18

The book of Deuteronomy ("second law") features what came to be regarded as the greatest commandment: "The LORD is our God, the LORD alone. You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul, and with all your might" (vv. 4–5). This forms the beginning of the Jewish daily prayer, the Shema. It was quoted by Jesus when he was asked, "Which commandment is the first of all?" (Mark 12:28).

We believe the same thing. God is our only Lord. We know God in Jesus Christ and we follow him out of love. We show our love by worshiping and serving God, as the Scriptures teach. In what we say and do, we express our love for God's grace and we live in gratitude.

The book of Leviticus records the familiar command: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself: I am the LORD" (Leviticus 19:18). This command comes in the midst of other commands about relating to neighbors: Don't take vengeance; don't hold a grudge against your neighbor—in short, "love your neighbor as yourself." The command to love your neighbor is the umbrella way of relating to other people. Jesus recognized this when he cited this as the second great commandment (Mark 12:31).

We thank God for loving us and we express our gratitude to God by sharing God's love with other people.

... In Your Children's Experiences

Children will be able to respond with what they think it means to love God. They will be able to come up with many ways to show their love for God when they are at home or when they are "out and about" (Deuteronomy 6:7, CEB).

Children learn about loving neighbors with words and actions. When they help take a meal to a neighbor or church member who is sick or when they assist in preparing and serving a meal, they experience ways to love a neighbor. There are so many opportunities for children of all ages to find their own ways to express love to others.

... In Your Relationships with the Children

Encourage all children to tell stories of how they can show love to others in daily acts. Invite the children to imagine with you the ways that they have seen people love God with their whole heart. Then invite them to say the ways they can love God that way. Use these words as a blessing, calling each by name as she or he leaves today.

> Gracious God, I give you my heart, my soul, and my might. Use me as you will. Amen.

GATHERING IN GOD'S GRACE

Post **SCM i–ii**, "Your Visual Schedule," to provide clear expectations and a visual cue for the group.

See **SCM iii–iv** for the key to icons (for example, **6 1**) and ways to adapt for children who have special needs or disabilities.

Welcoming and Preparing





Play "Praise God, Praise God"—MM 7—as children arrive. Welcome each child with "Grace and peace be with you, (*Name*)." Prompt the children to respond, "And also with you."

Invite the children to help prepare the setting as they arrive. Create a worship center with a green cloth, a candle, and a Bible.

Ask a few children to help prepare any "Responding in Gratitude" activities you may be doing today. Suggest that one or two prepare to lead today's singing. Have several volunteers practice the Scripture reading for today.

Provide copies of **GN 1** and crayons or markers. Invite children to write their name on the sheet then decorate it, creating a sign. You may suggest that they glue the sheet to colorful construction paper. When the children have finished, have them add their signs to the worship center.

Singing



Play the song "Praise God, Praise God"—MM 7; SCM 18—as the children listen. Play the song again and, together with the children, clap out the rhythm. Then join in singing.

Praying



Turn on the candle. Invite the children to pray a "popcorn" prayer. Explain that you will open the prayer and then pause for people to say words or phrases, popping the words like popcorn. If more than one person speaks at a time, assure the children that is all right. Pray:

Dear God, we love you with all that we are and all that we do. These are some of the ways we show our love for you . . . You want us to love our neighbors.

These are some of the ways we love others . . .

May all God's children say, "Amen" . . .

© Give children time to respond and to share; for some children, listening and speaking may take longer.



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Preparing to Hear the Story



On two sheets of newsprint, write the numbers 1–4 in a column on one sheet and 5–10 in a column on the other sheet. Ask the children what they know about the Ten Commandments. Write key words or phrases they suggest by each corresponding number. See **GN 2** for a list of commandments. Assist if children do not mention one or more commandments. If there are other suggestions that don't seem to fit any of the commandments, honor the suggestion and write it at the bottom of one of the papers, seeing if it might fall under the "Love God" or "Love Others" categories.

Ask children what the first four commandments have in common (Love God) and the second six commandments have in common (Love Others). Write those titles above each column.

Hearing the Story



Invite a volunteer to find Deuteronomy 6 in one Bible and another volunteer to find Leviticus 19 in another Bible. Ask volunteers to read Deuteronomy 6:1–9 and Leviticus 19:1–2, 9–18. Conclude the reading by saying, "Word of wisdom, Word of grace," and prompt the children to say, "Thanks be to God." Place the open Bibles on the worship center.

Invite the children to collect their signs from the worship center. Help the children learn the call and response that is repeated in the story:

Leader: Love God with your whole heart, soul, and strength. Children: Love your neighbor as yourself.

Read the story again using **SCM 6** or listen to the story audio. Encourage the children to hold up their signs and respond enthusiastically.


Reflecting on God's Grace



Form two groups and hand out Bibles. Cut a copy of **GN 3** in half; give one assignment to each group. Allow time for children to work on their verses, then gather together and have each group make its presentation to the other group. Discuss:

- What do you think it means to love God with heart, soul, and strength?
- ▶ What do you think it means to love your neighbor as yourself?

Gather around the newsprint labeled "Love God" and "Love Others." Brainstorm ideas of ways we can show love to God and people. Encourage children to use markers to record their ideas on the appropriate sheets. When all ideas have been given, invite everyone to add hearts to the sheets.

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Singing



Play and listen to "Love"—MM 24; SCM 21. Play again, inviting the children to sing the adapted second verse on the lyric sheet.

RESPONDING IN GRATITUDE

Select activities appropriate for your group and for the time available.

Claiming God's Grace



Teach the American Sign Language for the two commandments, using **SCM 6a**:

- ▶ Lead the children in saying the commandments after you.
- ► Teach the sign for *love*.
- ➤ Say the commandments together and sign *love* in each one.
- ► Teach the sign for *God* and repeat the commandments.
- ► Teach the sign for *neighbor* (*person near*), repeating while signing.
- ➤ Teach the sign for *yourself*.

By this time, the children will know the two commandments by heart. Challenge the children to teach others the commandments using sign language.

© Children can show generosity and compassion to people who are hearing impaired by learning and using American Sign Language. Learning even a few words helps develop awareness and sensitivity to cultural and linguistic diversity. Go to handspeak.com to learn a few key words and teach them to the children.



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Celebrating God's Grace







God talked about loving others and ourselves with every part of our being. Brainstorm together ways to love the way God wants us to.

Take turns lying down on mural paper and tracing around each other's bodies. Cut out the figures.

- On the head, write or draw something you could say to express your love to someone you care about.
- On the left arm, write or draw something you could do to show your love for people who are poor or homeless or people who live in other parts of the world.
- On the right arm, write or draw something you could do to show your love for the environment (animals, land, water, and so on).
- On the left leg, write or draw something you could do to show your love for someone in your family or community.
- On the right leg, write or draw something you could do to express your love for yourself.

Show your drawings to one another. Name how all of the things on the drawings express our love for God. Encourage children to take their drawings home as a reminder to celebrate the many ways we can show our love for God, others, ourselves, and the world.

Praying God's Grace



Today's story reminds us to love God, others, and ourselves. Invite children to choose three colors of yarn to represent God, others, and self.

- ➤ Cut yarn into 18" lengths.
- Secure the strands together with a knot 3" from the end.
- ▶ If necessary, demonstrate how to braid the three strands together to make a wristband.
- When enough yarn has been braided to go around a wrist, secure with another knot.
- Tie around wrists and cut off the excess.

Encourage the children to wear their wristbands as a prayerful reminder to love God, others, and themselves.

 Some children have difficulties with fine motor skills. Encourage children to try activities that require eye-hand coordination, such as braiding. Cheer their efforts. If the task seems too difficult, provide an alternative, such as just twisting or using pipe cleaners that may be easier to manipulate.



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Extra Activity

Provide copies of **GN 4** and pencils. Allow time for the children to find their way from God to Neighbor. Challenge the children to write or draw ways to show God's love in our everyday actions, filling the space around the maze.

LOVING AND SERVING GOD



Ask the children to help clean the space.

Gather around the water bowl. Pass the basket of stones and ask children to take three. Demonstrate dropping the stones in the water one at a time, while saying, "I can love God. I can love my neighbor. I can love myself."

Have children take turns dropping their stones in the water and saying the words. After all have had a turn, offer this prayer:


Dear God, thank you for all our neighbors, especially these neighbors who are our church friends: (*say each child's name*). Thank you, God, for loving us so much that we have love to share with each other. Amen.

Close by calling each child by name and saying, "Rejoice! God is always with you. Go in grace to love and serve the Lord!"

Love God




