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

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

Children with Disabilities and Special Needs



Movement

Some children need to move more than others. Setting boundaries for appropriate movement can allow the leader to meet the needs of the group while also meeting the needs of the child. Mark a place on the floor with tape, a mat, or a pillow. Be clear that the child can move within this space. Sometimes having two spots (chairs and pillows or mats) can be helpful.



Transitions

Transition times provide a challenge to children. Clear expectations, follow-through, and routine help with those times, but they may not be enough for some children. For children who struggle with transitions, consider quick physical activities—such as doing chair push-ups, squeezing your hands together, and stretching—before or after the transition.



Tactile Defensiveness

Sometimes children struggle with textured objects such as glue, clay, finger paint, and chalk. For some children, textures create real anxiety. Allow and encourage children to explore textures without pressure, and provide opportunities to wash or wipe their hands right away. For children who struggle with texture, find a way to participate in the activity without getting their hands dirty, such as being a timekeeper.



Adapting Activities

You can adapt an activity by process, product, or environment—the way that something is done, what is done, or the setting in which it is done. Giving extra support in the completion of a task is an example of changing the process; having children make something different is an example of changing the product. Instead of thinking, "This child can't do this," think, "How can I change this activity so that this child can do it?"



Behavior

Children's behavior can challenge us, disrupt the group, and lead to unsafe situations. Be clear about what you expect before you do the activity. If you don't want children to touch one another while they are in a circle, tell them that before they touch one another. Clear expectations let children know what the rules are. Using the included visual schedule is a great way to provide clear expectations and a visual cue for children to remember.



Supporting Children Who Have **Difficulty Communicating**

Reach out to parents and caregivers about alternative forms of communication used by children. Learning a few words in American Sign Language, becoming familiar with the Picture Exchange Communication System, or exploring how to support with other assistive technologies are examples of showing hospitality to the children. In addition, give children time to respond and to share; for some children, listening and speaking may take longer.



FA Food and Other Allergies

Remove all food and other products containing allergens. Post signs to help people remember the allergy. Have all children wash their hands and faces to avoid triggering a reaction.



Listening

Attending to a story or comprehending instructions can be a challenge for children who struggle with attention. Supporting these children requires consistency, clear expectations, and organization. Some hints that may help include clearly communicating expectations before the activity, checking for understanding, providing visual support as well as verbal instructions, building movement into activities, and supporting transitions.

G Leadership and Generosity

Focus on the strengths of the children, and learn to see them as gifted members of your community. Look for opportunities for them to express generosity. Offer them ways to practice leadership, such as passing out items, holding visual aids, helping other children, or serving as the example in games and activities.



Supporting Children Who Have Difficulty with Reading and Writing

Whenever children read aloud, ask for volunteers. Calling on a child who does not read at grade level may make him or her feel embarrassed and unwelcome. Always encourage children to write or draw pictures as part of their responses. Children then can share their drawings.



Supporting Children with Mobility Supports

As you set up, think about ample space between furniture to maneuver a wheelchair or walker. Think about materials and how they are positioned. Doing a roll-through in a wheelchair or walker can be a helpful way to make sure that your room setup is accessible. Think about including your children who use assistive devices. For example, seating all children on chairs or placing materials for a game on a table instead of on the floor are simple ways to create a more welcoming community.



VI Visual Impairment/Blindness

Talk with parents, caregivers, and children about the strengths and abilities of the child, as well as the best ways to offer support. Large print or special lighting may allow full access to the materials. Talk with parents or caregivers about the use of the copy machine or scanned images and a computer or tablet to enlarge print. Encourage children to describe their pictures and other creations in words as they share them.



Deaf/Hard of Hearing

To create a welcoming environment for children who are deaf or have difficulty hearing, provide visual supports, such as written instructions and copies of the stories told. Employ an interpreter, and encourage children and adults in the community to learn to communicate through American Sign Language. Limit background noise. Face a person before speaking. Become familiar with children who use assistive technology. Be sure to check with parents or caregivers of children who use cochlear implants or hearing aids about any special considerations.



Fairness

To make every child feel welcome and successful, think about fairness in a different light. Fairness is not every child getting the same thing; it is every child getting what she or he needs.



Fine Motor

Children ages 3–5 are developing their fine-motor skills. Support them by giving them opportunities to cut and color. Some children may become frustrated by those activities; you can help them by providing prepared materials.



Sensory Defensive

Some children have strong reactions to different stimuli. Help them feel more comfortable by putting them in charge of the challenging sensations, allowing them to take actions such as turning the lights on or off.

Ask for Help

A team approach to including people with disabilities in your congregation helps build understanding and knowledge in the congregation, provides support for the child and family, and makes including all of God's children in church school an attainable goal.

Moses and the Basket

(based on Exodus 1:8-2:10)

Once there was a tiny baby named Moses. Moses' mother and father loved him very much. They took good care of baby Moses.

Moses also had a big sister named Miriam. She loved him and helped to take care of him too.

I wonder, "What did Miriam like about being a big sister? What did she not like?"

The princess (Pharaoh's daughter) was standing by the river, not far from where baby Moses was hidden.



Miriam ran after her.


"Excuse me!" said Miriam. "Do you need someone to help you take care of that baby?"



God Makes a Way

(based on Exodus 13:17-22; 14:1-22)

The Hebrew people were free from slavery under Pharaoh. People called to one another, "Hurry! We have to leave."

The crowd of people walked, hurrying away from the city. (*walk fast in place*)

"Where are we going?" asked a child.

"We are leaving Egypt," said an elder. "God has saved us. We are going to the land that God promised us." (*slow down and walk in place*)

"Where is it?" asked another child. "How do we get there?"

"I don't know," said an elder, "but we follow Moses. He knows God's plan." (sit down)

I wonder, "What is God's plan?"

It was nighttime. When they got out of the city, the people started mumbling. They worried about getting lost in the dark.

Suddenly a pillar of fire made a bright light so everyone could see. They heard Moses shouting, "It is God's light showing us the way. Follow the light!" (stand and wave pillar of fire)

They walked all night following the light. (walk around the space following the pillar of fire)

When daytime came, they couldn't see the light, but God gave them a pillar of cloud to follow. (wave pillar of cloud)

The pillar of cloud led them to the Red Sea. (walk around the space following the pillar of cloud)

The Red Sea was too big to cross. It was too wide to go around. They had no boats!

I wonder, "What will God do to help the people?"

God told Moses, "Hold your hand over the water." (hold hands over the sea)

Moses did as he was instructed. Suddenly a big wind began to blow. (*blow on the sea*)

It blew and blew and blew. (while the children are blowing, use the scissors to cut the sea in half)


The wind pushed some of the water to one side. It pushed some of the water to the other side. Then right in the middle of the sea, a dry path appeared.

I wonder, "What did the people think when they saw the sea part?"

Everyone lined up to pass through the sea. One by one, they ran to the other side. (pass through the sea to the other side)

When everyone was safe across the sea, Moses stretched out his hand once more. The wind stopped blowing. The two walls of water crashed into each other, filling the sea again. (*place the sides of the sea back together*)

The people gave thanks. The Lord God had saved them. (*sit down*)



The People Care for God's Word

(based on Exodus 25:10-22; 37:1-9)

What a fantastic time it had been for the Hebrew people! Moses climbed the mountain to meet with God, and God gave the people ten essential rules to help them love God and love each other.

After a while, someone said, "Look! Moses is coming!"

When Moses got close, they could see he had stone tablets. Moses held the tablets up so everybody could see.

The tablets had writing on them. Moses said:

"These are ten rules of love from God. They tell us how to live God's way. We must take care of these special words."

I wonder, "What are the ten rules of love from God?"

Moses said, "God wants us to build a special box. We will put the stone tablets—the Ten Commandments—in the box to keep them safe."


I wonder, "What did the special box look like?"


The people built the box just as God told them. When the box was finished, Moses gently placed the stone tablets with the commandments on them inside the box.

Spying on the Promised Land

(based on Numbers 13:1-14:9)

God's people were slaves in Egypt for a long time. (\(\psi\), shake head) Then, God's power helped them get free. They were going to a new land that God promised to give them. (\(\psi\), nod head)

Moses led the people. They walked for a long time to get to the new land. (walk in place or pat hands on legs as if walking) Finally, they came to the new land! But they were not sure if it would be a good place to live. (shrug and look up) Moses picked out twelve people to go and see what the new land would be like. (count to twelve)

I wonder, "How did Moses pick the twelve people?"

Moses said: "Go up into the hill country and see what the area is like. See whether the people who live there are strong or weak, whether there are a few people or many, whether the towns have walls or no walls, and whether there are trees in it or not. Be bold and bring back some of the fruit of the land too!" (, nod head)

After forty days, the twelve returned to Moses, bringing grapes, pomegranates, and figs as big as their fists. (, nod head) They told Moses about the good land. (, nod head) They saw fields to graze sheep and goats, trees bursting with fruit, and buzzing bees making honey. (, nod head)


But ten of the spies were afraid. "The land is good," they said, "but we don't want to go. (\(\mathbb{P}\), shake head) We saw the people who live there. They are so big and strong, like giants! 
I wonder, "How would we feel if we saw people who were as large as giants?"


Two of the spies, Joshua and Caleb, disagreed with the others: "We should go to the land God has promised. God will be with us!" (, nod head)

Joshua and Caleb remembered how God saved the people from slavery in Egypt. (, nod head) They remembered that God promised them a homeland long ago. (, nod head) God provided food and water in the desert. (, nod head) God had given them rules to live by. (, nod head) God had always taken care of the people. (, nod head) God was faithful. (, nod head) Joshua and Caleb believed that God would always be faithful. (, nod head)

Joshua and Caleb gave a thumbs-up: "The Lord is with us. Let us be brave!" (and shout AMEN!)









Choose This Day Whom You Will Serve

(based on Joshua 24:14-28)

God had promised to care for the Hebrew people, but they didn't trust God's promise. God decided to let the people wander as they walked to their new homeland. They walked. And walked. And walked. For a long, long time, they walked.

I wonder, "How would it feel to just keep walking?"

When Moses died, Joshua, one of the people who had trusted God, became the leader. Joshua stopped the people at the Jordan River. On the other side they could see the Promised Land. Joshua trusted God to take care of the people. As Joshua led the people into the river, it parted. They carried the Ark of the Covenant safely to the other side.


The people whooped and cheered! "Yes! We will serve God too!"

Eli understood that it was God who was calling Samuel.



"I have one more son, but he is just a boy," Jesse answered. "His name is David, and he's out looking after the sheep."


Samuel said, "I want to meet him." When David arrived, God said, "This is the one I have chosen. I see that he has a good and kind heart."


I wonder, "Why did God choose David?"

God is there even on terrible, awful days.


When trouble seems to be around every corner, God is with me, always caring, always loving.


Leader: God is like a shepherd. **All: I will have everything I need.**

I wonder, "Why was it important that David remembered all that God had done?"


God looked after him every step of the way.

God Is My Rock

(based on Psalm 62: 1-2, 5-7)

I am David, king of Israel.

I wasn't always the king. As a young shepherd boy, I took my father's flock of sheep (*say*, "*baa-baa*") from low in the valley up the mountainsides by our home. I spent a lot of time out in the fields. I liked roaming with the sheep (*say*, "*baa-baa*"), lying in the cool grass on a hot day, and watching the stars on a clear night. Those were wonderful days!

Sometimes I would get scared. Howling animals (howl, "woooooo!) scared my sheep (say, "baabaa") or me. I'd look for stones to sling at wolves (howl, "woooooo!) and bears (hold hands like claws and say, "Rawr!"). During storms, the thunder cracked so loud my ears would ring. Sometimes at night, when everything was silent, I got scared being alone in the dark.

I wonder, "When are you afraid?"

To feel better I would pray, making up songs to God. I would sing softly to myself and to the sheep (say, "baa-baa") then louder and louder until I was sure God had scared the wolves (howl, "woooooo!) away or shouted down the thunder. God was with me. This was one of my song prayers:

In the silence, I am waiting for God. For God will save me.

God is my rock. (make a fist with right hand and pound it on left palm)

God is my help. (hold arms up being strong)

God is my fortress. (bring hands overhead like the peak of a roof)

I shall never be shaken! (shake slightly, then stand firm)

Even now, as a king, I still sing these songs. When I am afraid or troubled, they comfort me and give me hope. God is my rock. God is everywhere. God is always with us. God is unmovable and unshakeable. So, I pray these words again and again:

In the silence, I am waiting for God. For God will save me.

God is my rock. (make a fist with right hand and pound it on left palm)

God is my help. (hold arms up being strong)

God is my fortress. (bring hands overhead like the peak of a roof)

I shall never be shaken! (shake slightly, then stand firm)


God will deliver me from fears and troubles.


let everything that moves and breathes praise the Lord! (raise arms above head with hands out and waving, shouting, "Hallelujah! Praise God!")

"Don't say you are too young," answered God.


"All you have to do is listen. I will tell you where to go and you will go there. I will give you a message and you will speak it. I will put my words in your mouth. I will tell you what to say."

Did the potter throw away the clay? Goodness no! It was squashed down and stretched, and made into a ball again.


