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



### Movement

Some children need to move more than others. Setting boundaries for appropriate movement can allow the leader to meet the needs of the group while also meeting the needs of the child. Mark a place on the floor with tape, a mat, or a pillow. Be clear that the child can move within this space. Sometimes having two spots (chairs and pillows or mats) can be helpful.



#### **Transitions**

Transition times provide a challenge to children. Clear expectations, follow-through, and routine help with those times, but they may not be enough for some children. For children who struggle with transitions, consider quick physical activities—such as doing chair push-ups, squeezing your hands together, and stretching—before or after the transition.



### Tactile Defensiveness

Sometimes children struggle with textured objects such as glue, clay, finger paint, and chalk. For some children, textures create real anxiety. Allow and encourage children to explore textures without pressure, and provide opportunities to wash or wipe their hands right away. For children who struggle with texture, find a way to participate in the activity without getting their hands dirty, such as being a timekeeper.



### **Adapting Activities**

You can adapt an activity by process, product, or environment—the way that something is done, what is done, or the setting in which it is done. Giving extra support in the completion of a task is an example of changing the process; having children make something different is an example of changing the product. Instead of thinking, "This child can't do this," think, "How can I change this activity so that this child can do it?"



### **Behavior**

Children's behavior can challenge us, disrupt the group, and lead to unsafe situations. Be clear about what you expect before you do the activity. If you don't want children to touch one another while they are in a circle, tell them that before they touch one another. Clear expectations let children know what the rules are. Using the included visual schedule is a great way to provide clear expectations and a visual cue for children to remember.



## Supporting Children Who Have Difficulty Communicating

Reach out to parents and caregivers about alternative forms of communication used by children. Learning a few words in American Sign Language, becoming familiar with the Picture Exchange Communication System, or exploring how to support with other assistive technologies are examples of showing hospitality to the children. In addition, give children time to respond and to share; for some children, listening and speaking may take longer.



## FA Food and Other Allergies

Remove all food and other products containing allergens. Post signs to help people remember the allergy. Have all children wash their hands and faces to avoid triggering a reaction.



### Listening

Attending to a story or comprehending instructions can be a challenge for children who struggle with attention. Supporting these children requires consistency, clear expectations, and organization. Some hints that may help include clearly communicating expectations before the activity, checking for understanding, providing visual support as well as verbal instructions, building movement into activities, and supporting transitions.

### **5** Leadership and Generosity

Focus on the strengths of the children, and learn to see them as gifted members of your community. Look for opportunities for them to express generosity. Offer them ways to practice leadership, such as passing out items, holding visual aids, helping other children, or serving as the example in games and activities.



## Supporting Children Who Have Difficulty with Reading and Writing

Whenever children read aloud, ask for volunteers. Calling on a child who does not read at grade level may make him or her feel embarrassed and unwelcome. Always encourage children to write or draw pictures as part of their responses. Children then can share their drawings.



## Supporting Children with Mobility Supports

As you set up, think about ample space between furniture to maneuver a wheelchair or walker. Think about materials and how they are positioned. Doing a roll-through in a wheelchair or walker can be a helpful way to make sure that your room setup is accessible. Think about including your children who use assistive devices. For example, seating all children on chairs or placing materials for a game on a table instead of on the floor are simple ways to create a more welcoming community.



### Visual Impairment/Blindness

Talk with parents, caregivers, and children about the strengths and abilities of the child, as well as the best ways to offer support. Large print or special lighting may allow full access to the materials. Talk with parents or caregivers about the use of the copy machine or scanned images and a computer or tablet to enlarge print. Encourage children to describe their pictures and other creations in words as they share them.



### Deaf/Hard of Hearing

To create a welcoming environment for children who are deaf or have difficulty hearing, provide visual supports, such as written instructions and copies of the stories told. Employ an interpreter, and encourage children and adults in the community to learn to communicate through American Sign Language. Limit background noise. Face a person before speaking. Become familiar with children who use assistive technology. Be sure to check with parents or caregivers of children who use cochlear implants or hearing aids about any special considerations.



### **Fairness**

To make every child feel welcome and successful, think about fairness in a different light. Fairness is not every child getting the same thing; it is every child getting what she or he needs.



## Sensory Defensive

Some children have strong reactions to different stimuli. Help them feel more comfortable by putting them in charge of the challenging sensations, allowing them to take actions such as turning the lights on or off.

### Ask for Help

A team approach to including people with disabilities in your congregation helps build understanding and knowledge in the congregation, provides support for the child and family, and makes including all of God's children in church school an attainable goal.

#### Peter Tells about Jesus

(based on Acts 2:14a, 22-42)

It was the day of Pentecost. Jesus' followers had gathered to pray when it happened. The Holy Spirit had come on all of them. Now they were filled with power, just as Jesus had promised.

I wonder, "Why is Jesus God's chosen one?"


Peter explained that now the Holy Spirit would be with everyone who believed and followed Jesus.

(based on Acts 2:43-47)

The followers of Jesus loved to praise God. They would go out into the city to tell about God's love. Many people joined their community. Everyone was welcomed into the family.


Those who were lonely found friends.

He was so excited that he started walking and jumping and praising God. He followed Peter and John into the courtyard of the temple. All the people in the temple saw him walking around and singing praises to God.


They knew that he was the same man who begged beside the temple gate.

Saul became a leader in the church. He traveled to many places with the good news of Jesus.


Saul's life was completely changed by God's love. The changes were so big that Saul started using his Roman name, Paul.

He studied while he continued working in the slave trade. After dedicating his life to God, he worked to make the conditions of slaves better on the slave ships. Over the years, he eventually came to believe that slavery was wrong, and he worked to end it. He became blind in his later years.

(based on Acts 16:9-15)

Lydia had never met Jesus, but she really liked Paul's stories. Lydia knew that she wanted to become a follower of Jesus right away.



I wonder, "Who will help the jailer?"


Suddenly the **jailer** heard Paul's voice, calling, "Don't worry. We are all here."

Some people are like the mouth because they use words to teach and encourage. Others are like the hands because they help people.


Each person in the church is part of the body. Everyone does something different, but we all work together to show God's love. Remember, dear friends, we need each other because we are all part of God's church.


I wonder, "How are we part of God's church?"

One of these new church leaders was named Paul. Paul traveled to many faraway cities and countries. One of the new churches he helped was in Corinth (KAWR-ihnth).

Even when he could not travel, Paul wrote letters to his friends in Corinth, teaching them about Jesus and helping them to know how to live as Christ's followers.

I wonder, "How did letters get to people in Paul's time?"

Once when the people in the church in Corinth were having disagreements, Paul wrote to tell his friends about love. This is what he wrote:

Even if I speak like an angel, with the most beautiful words, if I do not speak in love, I sound like a banging gong or a clanging cymbal.

If I can tell the future and understand all the mysteries of the world, or have so much faith that I can make a mountain move, without love, I am nothing.

Even if I give away all my possessions, if I have no love, it means nothing.

Love means being patient.

Love means being kind.

Love does not get jealous or brag or act rudely.

Love doesn't insist on its own way, get irritable, or keep score.

Love isn't happy with injustice but is happy with what's right.

Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, and endures all things.

Love never ends.

As for everything else—words and knowledge—they will end. They are all bits and pieces, but love is everything.

When I was a child, I did childish things. But now that I am an adult, I do different things.


In the same way, we are like God's children: We only know a little of what God knows. Later God will show us everything!

For now, though, God has given us three gifts to help us: faith, hope, and love.

And the greatest of these three is love.

Wow! The people in the church in Corinth were so happy to hear about love. They wanted to try and live as God's followers, loving God and loving one another.

I wonder, "How can we love like Paul describes?



### God's House

(based on Ephesians 2:17-22)

The followers of Jesus traveled to many faraway cities and countries to teach about Jesus. Wherever they went, people believed their message, and the church grew. One of the new church leaders was Paul. After visiting a place, Paul often wrote letters to the people to teach them about Jesus and help them to know how to live as Christ's followers. After Paul died, his helpers continued to write these letters.

I wonder, "Why were letters so important?"

One of the places where believers gathered as a part of God's church was a place called Ephesus (EH-fuh-suhs). As in many places at that time, there were no church buildings, so the people of God met in someone's house. One day a letter came for the people in Ephesus. It spoke about living the way Jesus did and loving the way Jesus loved. It was a long letter, and here is part of it.

Dear friends in Christ,

You are like a house that God owns. God's house is built on the foundation that the apostles and prophets prepared. The whole house is joined together in Christ, and he makes it grow and become a holy temple in the Lord. And in Christ, you are being built together with all people who love God, no matter what differences you have. All of you are being made into a place where God lives through the Spirit.

The people thought carefully about the letter. They thought about all the ways God's Spirit was making them into a house.

I wonder, "How can the church (or believers) be a place where God lives?"

One person said, "We are like a house with the Bible as our foundation. We learn from the prophets' and apostles' words."

Another commented, "We are like the walls and roof of the house because we protect each other and keep each other safe."




The people began to talk about the beautiful things God had done for them. Before long, they were saying thank you to God for all the good things in their lives.


I wonder, "How can we give thanks for God's gifts?"

(based on Philippians 4:4-9)

Paul was a follower of Jesus. He traveled to lots of faraway places to spread the good news about Jesus. Many people who heard Paul speak about him became followers of Jesus too. Paul started churches, baptizing people and teaching the new followers about God's love, Jesus, and how to live as he taught. After Paul left a place, the Christians would meet together to worship and learn and help others. One place where Paul told the story of Jesus was the city of Philippi (fih–LIP–eye).

Paul ran into some difficulties in Philippi. He and Silas were put in jail for telling people about Jesus. Later, after Paul left Philippi, life was not easy for the new believers. Some people didn't want them telling others about Jesus. Then they heard that Paul was put in prison in another city.

I wonder, "What did the people think would happen to them if they talked about Jesus?"

The people were sad that Paul was in jail and life was hard for them in Philippi. They were discouraged and wondered if they had enough faith to keep living the way God wanted them to live. Paul heard that the people in Philippi were discouraged, so he wrote a letter to them. He wanted to encourage them in their faith. He wrote:

My dear friends in Christ,

I love you and miss you so much. You bring me such joy. Be strong in the Lord. Rejoice in the Lord always! Again, I will say, Rejoice!

Show everyone that you are gentle and kind. Jesus will come again soon.


Do not worry about anything. Instead of worrying, pray. Let God know everything. And when you pray, be sure and give thanks to God. It is then that God's peace will settle upon you, calming your hearts and your minds, knowing that Jesus is with you. It's hard to understand, but that's how God works.

I wonder, "What can I do in a difficult situation?"





## Clothing Christ-Style

(based on Colossians 3:12-17)

A long time ago, there was a place where the followers of Jesus met together as part of the church. This was in the city of Colossae (ko-LAH-see).

When the church met, there was a lot of singing and praying and talking. The people loved Jesus very much. They wanted to learn how to live like Jesus and show God's love the way Jesus did.

The most important thing to wear each day is love. If you have love, you won't go wrong.


Live in peace and remember to give thanks for all of God's blessings. Read the Scriptures and sing to God often. Do everything in the name of Jesus.

Timothy challenged the gathered believers. "Now you have heard the story. It's your turn to pass it on. Who will you tell?"



I wonder who Alexander could pass the story of Jesus to.












