

God Hears Daniel's Prayers (based on Daniel 6:6–23)


God Hears Daniel's Prayers

(based on Daniel 6:6-23)

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

Recognizing God's Grace

- Read and enjoy the story with your children imagine and wonder.
- Play "Mouths Closed" charades. Write the names of animals on cards. Let your children choose a card and act it out, keeping their mouth closed, just like the lions in the den.
- Put the description of a problem around the necks of some of your stuffed animals. Scatter the animals around the house. Let your children search for the animals, then discover the problem described and discuss a solution together.



Responding to God's Grace

- The king's advisors were tricky people and led him to put his friend Daniel in great danger. Talk with your children about protecting themselves from tricky people.
- Ask your children if they know what jealousy is. Ask if they have ever seen its impact at school, in sports, or somewhere else.
- Ask your children when Daniel demonstrated faith. Was it only when he was in the lions' den, or was it also when he prayed to God, even when it was against the law?

Celebrating in Gratitude

- Help your children make paper-plate lions. Search the Internet for examples of masks or crafts. Invite your children to be the lions before Daniel entered the den and after. What changed the lions?
- Search the Internet for lion cupcakes. Choose one that you and your children can make together.
- Pray this prayer:

God, thank you for saving me. I will trust in you. Amen.
