

Surprised by Grace

(based on Luke 1:5-25, 57-66)

Use one or more activities from each section to explore grace and gratitude with your children this week.

Recognizing God's Grace

- Advent wreath—When your family is together for a meal this week, read the Bible story, and light the first and second candles of the wreath. Wonder together where God's grace is in this story.
- Invite your child to listen for action words that tell how Zechariah responded to the angel's news and the baby's birth. Read the story again, and encourage everyone to make faces, sounds, or movements for words such as jumped, amazed, and gasped.
- The story says that Zechariah was silent and then he sang a song of praise and thanks in a loud voice. Challenge your child to think of signs and songs that he or she would use to praise and thank God.



Responding to God's Grace

- ▶ Help your child discover the meaning of his or her given names by researching them online or in books at the library. Talk to your child about the day he or she was born—or, if adopted, his or her "gotcha day." Discuss the decisions made in the naming process. If you have no information about a child's name, identify a gift or skill he or she has that helps people experience God's love.
- Invite each person to create a mirror image of his or her name by folding a sheet of blank paper in half lengthwise, opening the paper, and printing the name above the fold by pressing firmly with a crayon. When the names are finished, refold the papers and rub them with wooden spoons or other solid objects. When papers are unfolded, everyone should have reflections of their names. Invite everyone to think about what it means to be a reflection of God's grace in the world.

Celebrating in Gratitude

- In gratitude for God's grace, participate in a season of giving by selecting a name from an angel tree at church or from a social-service organization. Pray daily for the person(s). Make plans to save money for buying—as well as wrapping and delivering—the requested gift(s).
- Give with gratitude for Advent by finding one item of clothing or a toy you no longer use to donate to a homeless shelter.
- Pray the following prayer this week:
 - Dear God, help us look with hope for your presence in the world. Amen.
