

An Apostle in Prison: Paul's Letter to the Philippians



This Lent, our church community will journey together through one of the New Testament's most hopeful texts: Paul's Letter to the Philippians. Written while Paul was imprisoned, this short letter offers a remarkably rich reflection on faith, suffering, joy, and Christian community.

Over five weeks, small groups will read the letter closely, focusing on one chapter each session. We will begin by exploring Paul's experience of imprisonment and the world in which this letter was written, then turn to the theological themes that emerge from the text: the meaning of suffering in Christian life, early understandings of Christ, justification by faith, resurrection hope, church leadership and conflict, generosity, and solidarity with those who suffer.

Small groups provide space to engage Scripture in community through guided discussion, shared reflection, and deep listening. As we listen to Paul's words from prison, we will reflect together on what it means to live faithfully in challenging circumstances—and how joy, hope, and courage take shape in lives formed by Christ. This Lent, we are invited not only to study an ancient letter, but to discover how its message still speaks to the life of the church and the world we inhabit today.

Linked-In Learning Groups meet weekly for six weeks.
